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In Principio – Incipit Index of Latin Texts

Those who are interested in the writers, texts and manuscripts of Antiquity and the Middle Ages know how difficult it is to identify a particular work encountered by chance in a manuscript, or, when studying or publishing a particular text, to make an inventory of all the manuscripts in which it appears. The incipit or first words of a work thus remain the surest means of designating it unambiguously. In a sense, the incipit, by virtue of its invariability, is the identity card of the text.

Standing apart from the diversity of attributions and titles, the incipit guarantees the presence of a particular text. The incipit serves as a link between the text and the manuscript. The search software of *In Principio* enables to answer two main questions about the incipit:

- who is the author and what is the title of the text?
- which manuscripts contain the text?

Mission

The incipit and explicit serve to put texts and manuscripts into relationship with one another. Thus *In Principio* lends itself to two principle functions:

- identifying texts written in the Latin language, from its origin to around 1500; for instance, when analysing the contents of a manuscript;
- locating manuscripts which transmit a work, particularly for researchers preparing a critical edition of the work or a study of its transmission.

In addition to searching by incipit and explicit, *In Principio* users can search any of the fields appearing in the search screen. Querying the Author and Work fields, for example, is useful in three cases:

- in constructing a list of incipits associated with a given text;
- when attempting to identify an author whose name is known only in part (that is, by performing an author search);
- when attempting to identify texts described in a medieval inventory (that is, through performing a title search)

Key Features

- Over 1.4 million records from three major institutions and libraries, supplemented with a growing number of individual collections
- Approximately 25,000 new entries each year
- A search screen providing guidance by offering ten search fields that enable precise searching
- Multilingual search interface (English, French, German)
- Links with the *Bibliographie Annuelle du Moyen Âge Tardif (BAMAT-Online)*, and with *Clavis Clavium (Clavium)*, the go-to database to access Late Antique and Medieval Christian Literature (available in Open Access)
- Integration of orthographic equivalencies, to accommodate variations in medieval spelling

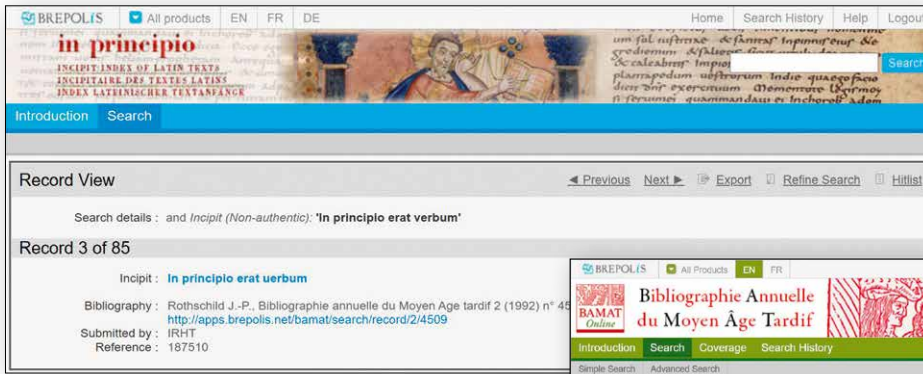
